I had the privilege of serving as our SI Chico Club President during one of our most difficult club years. 2020/2021 was not only a challenge for our club, but our entire community, and the rest of the nation, as well. We learned new ways to overcome the challenges of not being able to be with each other in person. Due to the COVID-19 guidelines, we spent the entire year doing everything virtually, thank goodness for Zoom and other online platforms.

I was still trying to get my life back on track, after the 2018 Camp Fire, when I chose my Presidency "Theme, Focus, Motto, Mantra, Quote, and Logo". Little did I know how important the "Attitude of Gratitude" was going to be,

for me to serve as President during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. I found myself repeating the "Attitude of Gratitude" mantra several times a day. It is very easy to become overwhelmed with all the negativity we are constantly surrounded by on television and social media. Through an "Attitude of Gratitude", I have been able to grow both emotionally and spiritually throughout my term as SI Chico President.

I chose to focus on "Women and Children with Intellectual Disabilities" during my term as President. I feel we accomplished this throughout our club year. My President's project this year was helping Catalyst remodel the playroom at their HAVEN location. The playroom was remodeled to help calm and heal children who have experienced trauma, and/or have intellectual and/or developmental disabilities, while helping to promote developmental progress, both mentally and emotionally. We donated \$6,000 to Catalyst to cover the cost of the playroom remodel and we also donated \$5,000 to the ARC of Butte County, to help remodel their children's playground, to make it more accessible for children of all abilities. There were many more projects and organizations that our club assisted financially during our 2020/2021 club year. We will be doing a recap of all the positive contributions our club has made this year during our last two meetings in June, so please be sure to join us on Zoom at noon for our weekly club meetings.

I would like to close by expressing my thanks and gratitude to all of our club members who hung in there this year. This will be a club year to go down in history, and I am thankful and grateful that you were here to walk the path with me. I truly appreciate your commitment to help make this year a success.

Soroptimist's global program for girls – Dream It Be It – is a career support program that targets girls in secondary school who face obstacles to their future success. This program provides high school students with access to professional role models, career education, and resources to live their dreams. Soroptimist International of Chico and Soroptimist International of Bidwell Rancho have teamed up to deliver this program since 2018.

The Soroptimist Dream Programs ensure that women and girls have access to the education and training they need to reach their full potential and live their dreams. The program goal is to empower girls to pursue their career goals. Over the past three years, SI Chico and SI Bidwell Rancho team up to provide local high school girls (and boys) at Fairview High School this key Soroptimist Dream Program. The two clubs split up the seven sessions for the career class at Fairview High School. Every other week, SI Chico and SI Bidwell Rancho deliver their sessions.

The Dream It Be It Program was designed by Soroptimist International of the Americas and can be delivered as a one-day conference or over the course of seven weeks. Our program has traditionally been given over seven weeks. SI Chico delivered sessions two, four, and six, and SI Bidwell Rancho delivered sessions one, three, and five. Session seven was a joint collaboration.

Session one's topic helped students "Discover Your Dreams". Session two was all about "Exploring Careers". We had three different guest speakers join us via Zoom to share their story with the students. A common theme from all three of the guests was they received on-the-job training. Our guest speakers were Staci Huestis from California Water Service, Rachelle Neal of Flowers by Rachelle, and Christine Berk of Northern California National Bank. Students learned the value of networking with professionals from various backgrounds and to follow their heart.

Session three was "Creating Achievable Goals" followed by session four, "Rising Above Obstacles". Renee Thatford led this session for SI Chico and was joined by guest speaker Micah Hankins, a local entrepreneur, fitness enthusiast, and military veteran. The students devoured his talk, and the instructor asked Micah to stay for the second class session which normally views the recorded version of the live delivery. This was super special for Micah, for the students, and for Soroptimists.

Session five talked about how to "Turn Failure into Success". Session six addressed how to "Balance Your Stress". This session was led by President-Elect Sara and Bonnie Chapman joined the session as the guest speaker. We talked about how to manage stress instead of trying to balance stress, as well as self-care ideas including a good nightly routine, drinking tea, weight training, cuddling with your fur baby, going for a walk, and meditation. Bonnie talked about art therapy as a form of managing stress. We shared photos of rock painting, including the Inspiration Trail in Utah that Bonnie had visited on a recent trip. We provided the students each with a rock, primed and ready to paint and a bag of painting supplies to create an inspirational rock of their own. The response was overwhelming from this session, as students stayed late beyond their class period to finish painting their individual rocks.

Session seven wrapped it all up on May 6. Babette from SI Bidwell Rancho invited another SIBR member to talk about her career path and Sara had President Billie and her daughter, Ali join the session. Both President Billie and Ali had fascinating journeys to share with the class.

Dream It Be It was a huge success this year, even delivered virtually. There was wonderful collaboration both between clubs and within our membership with a variety of people stepping up to contribute. We feel positively about delivering this Soroptimist Program to Fairview and feel that we are helping girls (and boys) at this extension high school reach their goals in meaningful, measurable ways. Looking ahead to next year and beyond, Babette and Sara want to expand this program to other schools in the Chico and surrounding areas in a one-day conference. This doesn't happen on its own. We need volunteers from our club to step up and help start the planning now. The curriculum is written for you. We just need the heart – you, our Soroptimist sisters in volunteerism! Join the Dream It Be It team today.

More about rock painting

friends bought tacos and burritos and handed them out to the homeless community in Oroville. She played soccer and loves to sing. She hopes to play the cello one day. Soroptimist International of Chico's Ruby Award: Women Helping Women winner Alexa Benson-Valavanis has been chosen the SNR Ruby Award Regional Winner!

Alexa Benson-Valavanis, winner of SI Chico's Ruby Award: Women Helping Women, has been chosen the Ruby Award winner by the Sierra-Nevada Region! Our club is beyond grateful for this recognition of Alexa's charitable work at the North Valley Community Foundation, where she has served as president and CEO since 2005 and delighted that she will be recognized more widely through this award.

Under Alexa's leadership NVCF has grown from serving a dozen clients to more than 500 and generated revenue of over \$175 million, soon to be increased by the foundation's

partnership with Aaron Rodgers, whose donation from guest hosting Jeopardy! will go directly to supporting small businesses in our area.

After the Camp Fire Alexa transformed the foundation into the lead philanthropic organization to support relief and recovery efforts, and in the last year built a COVID-19 response arm to slow the pandemic and provide relief to at-risk populations. To date NVCF has granted more than \$36 million for wildfire recovery and \$1.2 million for COVID-19 response.

Alexa runs a predominantly women-staffed operation with her grounding as a wife and mother. Unconditional love is the heart of everything she believes and strives for, finding and harnessing the inherent good in humanity. What an amazing role model for all of us!

Friendship Link- SI Nara



What is a Friendship Link?

Friendship links began many years ago to reinforce the nature of our work as a global organization. By creating relationships with clubs in other countries, we can cooperatively serve and work toward our mission. Clubs are encouraged to create these links with one another which can be done informally via meetups at conventions or through visits, or with a formal application matching process through SIA.

SI Chico has a total of four friendship links, SI St Albans, England, SI Macatti in the Phillipines, SI Togo and SI Nara Japan, which is the one I will be talking about today. Of special note is the fact that SI St. Albans and SI Nara are also friendship links with one another. Margaret VanLaanMartin had the pleasure of interacting with both clubs at St. Albans 50th anniversary.

SI Nara

Our friendship link with SI Nara resulted from a match through SIA and the idea may have originated at a Federation meeting in Seattle many years ago. The relationship was furthered at the SIA Biennium that was held in Hawaii during Susan Evers McCauley's Presidency. The attendees from

both clubs stuck up conversation and friendship during the event. The bond has remained strong over the years and has included visits and many joint projects.

Joan Stoner has visited SI Nara twice, in 2018 along with myself, Natalie Conrad, Carrie Pavis and Gayle Aylward and also with Kit Hutchinson when SI Nara celebrated their 30th anniversary. Here's what she said about that visit;

Our visit in 2018 during the Biennium convention in Yokohama reflected the same feeling of being honored guests and treated so well. It is a relationship built on mutual respect, working together for the greater good and truly enjoying learning about one another.

Also, when Julie Rankin was President of SI Chico, our members visited Nara and stayed in the homes of their members.

A few joint projects of note;

We have contributed to SI Nara's efforts to assist with an orphanage in Africa

During Carol Braziel's Presidency, SI Nara sent us model cars to distribute to schools in Butte County as part of a project they were working on.

SI Nara has worked jointly with SI Chico on Dress a Girl for the past several years and has sent wonderful handmade dresses for us to include in our packages to girls in need.

In the aftermath of the Camp Fire, SI Nara reached out immediately to us asking how they could assist. They sent an initial donation and then later followed up with another large donation to purchase a Tiny House jointly with SI Chico.

Friendship links are truly valuable and provide club members with a global experience and perspective in addition to allowing us to work hand in hand.
