

President's Message

Hello Fellow Soroptimists,

It's hard to believe that we are heading into our fourth month of the club year. Time flies when you're having fun! (Dance party, anyone?) We have been very busy during the first few months of our club year. I will try to recap everything we have been doing.

We started the year approving our operating budget for the club year. (The club year runs July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022). We had a challenging year last year, as did most nonprofits, and our finances reflect that challenge. To help close the budget gap, the admin committee advised us on several ways to fix the budget gap, and our club voted to move the excess available funds from the Legacy Fund in the amount of \$3,640 to our operating budget. Fundraising has their work cut out for them this year, but so far, the committee and the club has really stepped up our game to help close the

funding gap, too. Internal fundraising helps fund the operations of the club using various ways and means, like Christmas in November, Happy Dollars, Soroptiwear, and the \$100 for 100 years letter.

Speaking of fundraising, we had our Fall Bistro Bag fundraiser, and boy, was it delicious. Thank you to the fundraising committee for organizing a wonderful fall treat for us and raising funds for next year's giving. Remember, external fundraising dollars raised this year go to giving for next year. The more we raise this year, the more we give away next year.

We welcomed four new members this fall. Welcome to Theresa Draper, Nikki Stadler, Lois Buchter, and Amy Griffin. We are so excited to have you as a part of our club. Keep an eye out for more Getting To Know Us events to invite friends who are interested in joining. Membership is a part of the SI Objectives committee. This is an important committee that houses the objectives and programs that come from SIA, our federation. The programs include membership, the Live Your Dream award, and Dream It Be It. SIA's Big Goal for 2021-2031 is to invest in the dreams of half a million women and girls through access to education. Our contribution as SI Chico to SIA's Big Goal starts locally with the dream programs – Live Your Dream and Dream It, Be It. We will have more information for these projects in the spring, including my President's Project. Everyone is welcome to help in the planning process. The more, the better. I want everyone in our club to join this focus and help increase our impact in these Dream Programs in any way you can help.

In Magalia, Pine Ridge School unveiled the stained-glass art project we helped fund as part of the Camp Fire recovery efforts. Thank you to Shari Hopper for spearheading this project and to Past Presidents Billie and Bonnie for attending the unveiling.

In October, the events committee hosted Retreat at the Chico Masonic Family Center. It was so much fun to get together to talk about our club year and the goals we are working together on to achieve. The events committee really outdid themselves on this event. I can't wait for the club's birthday in January 2022. We also attended the district 1 meeting via Zoom in October. The next district meeting will be in the winter.

The giving committee has been busy this fall. With the help of a generous donor from within the club, the giving committee has selected the Salvation Army Adult Rehabilitation and Transitional Living Program as the recipient of the Mental Health Grant of \$10,000. We also have several hands-on projects we are working on. These include: Salvation Army Bell Ringing, Girls on the Run 5K Course Monitors, and the Boys & Girls Club of Northern California's Holiday Gift Shop.

We also helped at the Butte Humane Society's Grand Opening in November. While this wasn't an official hands-on project, we had an amazing opportunity to meet the community and tell them about Soroptimists. Telling the community about Soroptimists is the Communications committee's number one job. In coordination with the 100-year Anniversary ad hoc committee, the club has received some amazing coverage in the community. Most of this coverage has been about Soroptimist International's 100-year birthday.

The 100-year ad hoc committee also arranged to have billboards put up over town. Have you seen them? We had eight in October and November and will have four up in December. But the best part of the 100-year celebration was getting to attend the Girl Scouts of Northern California's groundbreaking ceremony on October 2, 2021. We were invited to partake in this momentous event as one of the major donors to their project on Floral Avenue. Past Presidents Bonnie Chapman and Billie Araiza, both key members of the 100-year ad hoc committee, were there to be a part of this occasion, as well as communications chairs Joyce Brown and Laura Burghardt. Many other club members were in attendance, too. Our club is giving the Girl Scouts of Northern California \$20,000 to help build the outdoor Pavilion and outdoor bathroom at their new property.

In closing, I want to wish everyone happy holidays and hope you get some time to relax and unwind. I am looking forward to some downtime coming up in the next couple of weeks over Thanksgiving and then, again, over Christmas and the New Year. We will continue working on our upcoming events and projects to serve women and girls who thirst for greatness as we move into the next six months of our club year.

SDR District 1 Meeting Oct. 30, 2021

The Highlights

- Sierra Nevada Region (SNR) Governor Sara spoke about the importance of clubs getting back to meeting in-person. She said that each club should have a designated "Covid protocol" person for larger gatherings and events.
- The region lost 100 members over the course of the pandemic and 3 clubs are disbanding including SI Orland and SI Redding. We now have 52 clubs in our region. Comparatively, there are 1,221 clubs in SIA and 27 disbanded during Covid.
- Lots of encouragement for recruitment of new members and younger members. The median age of members in our region is 64.
- We were encouraged to have prior award recipients, especially from the distant past, come back and update us on their lives. This can be profound.
- SI Chico was acknowledged in four of the five possible areas for recognition for club achievement including

- SNR Governor Elect Lisa talked about her upcoming transition to the job and the many volunteers she is seeking. There are tons of volunteer opportunities large and small within the region if you are interested, President Sara has the info. - Plans are well underway for our April conference, in person at the Atlantis **April 1-3**. Hopefully we will have a fun crew attend from SI Chico.
- SIA's convention will be in Seoul Korea in July of 22, so far about 10 Soroptimists from the region plan to attend. If you are interested, they will be coordinating travel etc.

(Soroptimist Orientation Leadership Training) Submitted By Linda Kerch

We all should know that Soroptimist started in the USA in Oakland in 1921. What we may not know is that the original Soroptimist club was influenced greatly by the Rotary club whose men's club promoted the support of professional women as well as the ideals of service and intemationalism.

It seems that the Soroptimist movement started because the early Soroptimists were unwilling to accept the subordinate position implied by the structure of the Rotary.

Mission Statement

Through International partnerships and a global network of members, Soroptimists inspire action and create opportunities to transform the lives of women and girls by: Advocating for equity and equality; creating safe and healthy environments; increasing access to education; Developing leadership and practical skills for a sustainable future.
