Sierra Nevada Region Conference Report, April 2022

- 42 of our Regions 53 Clubs attended the conference with 220 total in attendance. The theme of the conference was storytelling, and most presentations wove that into how we present our programs and clubs to others.
- SI Chico had 12 in attendance including 2 first timers.
- Financial report of the region shows them having a balance of \$240,000
- Our club was awarded 2nd place for great presence on social media.
- There was consistent messaging and discussion about the Big Goal and our collective impact, which is to have our Dream Programs reach half a million girls and women in the next 10 years.
- There was an amendment to the SNR Bylaws proposed which would allow members to continue membership in a club of their choosing regardless of where they live. Such members would participate in a hybrid manner. Other regions have already enacted this type of change. Our region had a spirited discussion, and, in the end, the amendment passed.
- There is a pot of money for endowment grants that weren't used during Covid. These are up to \$1,000 and the application window is September 15-March 1. If we have a project that we would like funded, apply next year.
- In our region, during 2020/21, 10,178 girls were served by Dream it Be it programs which is actually a 41% decrease (due to the pandemic). Numbers are expected to increase in 2022/23
- The biggest news is that our own Billie Araiza was elected as the new Sierra Nevada region District 1 Director. We are super proud of her and look forward to supporting her in this new leadership position over the next biennium.
- Otherwise, fun was had by all who attended. There were a few winners at the blackjack tables, a few martini's shared, lots of laughing and we can't say much more since what happens at conference, stays at conference. Join us next time!


The year 2021-2022 was a challenging one to create events to raise sufficient funds for our Club's next year giving needs, but our committee got creative with successful fundraisers.

Our total external fundraising effort is \$9934 for use in 2022-2023 year.


Internal Fundraising had a good year of fundraising, thanks once again to our wonderfully generous club members.

I am currently attending Butte College. Eventually, I plan to finish a bachelor's degree in creative arts and then launch my own photography business.






Xena & Joan Stoner

Stuart Morrow a past organizer of the Rotary Clubs visited the Parker Goddard Secretarial School in Oakland and was inspired to consider a club for business and professional women.

Originally membership was limited to only one member per professional classification. The professions charter members consisted of Multigraphing, Skin and Scalp treatment, business college partner, Real Estate, Piano teacher, Optometrist and the proprietor of a corset and blouse store.

The original group met at the Hotel Oakland in the dining room for lunch. The group decided that their name tags were to be orange with blue lettering.

By August the group had grown to 14 members and here it is noted that Miss Violet Richardson was the featured speaker that day. She was in charge of physical education at the Berkeley School.

By the 6th meeting the club had grown to 27 members! Seven new members were welcomed. It was at this meeting that Violet Richardson became a member. Helena Gamble also became a member at this meeting and is one of the most influential members in the coming years. She worked to charter new clubs with Morrow and after the federation was formed in 1928 she was appointed historian.

From this meeting the following phrases should still resonate 100 years later:

- We meet for Recognition plus Cooperation equal Service.
- Perhaps the most prophetic statement is "A big movement has been started by this club".
